Every season is an exciting time at the National Civil War Naval Museum at Port Columbus. Even if you've visited Port Columbus before, a return visit will always reveal something new. Their calendar is packed with special events all season long with the entire family in mind.

The National Civil War Naval Museum at Port Columbus is the nation's most innovative new museum dedicated to the Civil War navies. Featured are rare artifacts. interactive exhibits, battle simulator and the world's largest surviving ironclad ship.

CSS Jackson - Originally built at near 225 feet long, the surviving hull of the Jackson is 180 feet in length and 50 feet wide. This unique ironclad ram was built at the Confederate Naval Shipyard in Columubs, Georgia and nearing completion when the city fell to a Union Cavalry column in April of 1865. CSS Chattahoochee – This all wood gunboat, both steam and sail powered, was built in Saffold, Georgia, just above the Florida state line on the Chattahoochee River. In addition to dozens of other boats and ships, some of the rarest Civil War naval artifacts in the country now reside at Port Columbus.

New on the grounds at Port Columbus is a full-scale replica of the USS Waterwitch, representing one of the most exciting events in Civil War naval history. Climb aboard the Waterwitch to get a taste of what life was like sailing the high seas.

National Infantry Museum & Soldier Center



The National Infantry Museum near Fort Benning contains a large collection of military art and artifacts and follows the steps of the Infantryman across two centuries of courage and determination. Triumphant victories, dispiriting defeats and day-to-day life are interpreted in the

paintings and sculptures of world renowned artists. Weapons carried by allies as well as enemies and a wide range of support equipment from the American Revolution to the present are on display. A museum devoted to the history and tradition of the Infantry was formulated in 1957 and the Museum opened two years later. Fort Benning – one of the most modern military training centers in the nation, was chosen as its logical site. Tens of thousands of visitors from every state and numerous foreign countries have visited the museum. Families with different interests soon discover the museum is much more than things painted Army green.

Andersonville

Andersonville, or Camp Sumter as it was officially known, was one of the largest of many Confederate military prisons established during the Civil War. It was built early in 1864 after Confederate officials decided to move the large number of Federal prisoners kept in and around Richmond, Virginia to a place of greater security and a more abundant food supply. During the 14 months the prison existed, more than 45,000 Union soldiers were confined here. Of these, almost 13,000 died from disease, poor sanitation, malnutrition, overcrowding or exposure to the elements. Today, Andersonville National Historic Site is the only park in the National Park System to serve as a memorial to all American prisoners of war throughout the nation's history. The 495-acre park consists of the historic prison site and the National Cemetery. In 1998 the National Prisoner of War Museum opened at Andersonville, dedicated to the men and women of this country who have suffered captivity. Their story is one of sacrifice and courage.





Jimmy Carter Site (54 miles): Victory Drive (US 280) to Plains.

Little White House: GA 85 North to Warm Springs (42 miles).
