



Come and explore the *Dub*Denman Canoe Trail which is 27
miles of the Tallapoosa River in
Haralson County, Georgia.

The Tallapoosa River runs 265 miles from the southern end of the Appalachian mountains southward and westward through Alabama. The beautiful Tallapoosa River is the perfect place for canoeing, kayaking, and tubing. The water is clear and the scenery is beautiful. The Dub Denman Canoe Trail has 4 convenient launch sites in Haralson County, Georgia.

through town approximately 5 miles to Pope Rd.Turn right and travel 1/4 mile to Poplar Springs Road. Turn right. Launch site is approximately 1 mile on the left before you cross the bridge.

Launch Site: GA Hwy 100

This launch site is located off of GA Hwy 100 in Tallapoosa, GA. The average float time between GA Hwy 100 and Broad Street is 2 hours.

Directions from downtown, head north on Hwy 100 approximately 2 miles. Water Works launch site is on the right. Take an immediate left in front of gate down to the river.


This launch site is located off of Broad Road in Tallapoosa, GA. The average float time between Broad Street and Lazy River Rentals is 2 hours.

From downtown, head north on Hwy 100 approximately 1 mile. Broad Street is on the left. Travel 2 miles to the Tallapoosa River. Plenty of parking available

Lazy River can furnish your paddling needs from canoe, kayak or tube. Call ahead for reservations. They will also furnish put in and take out transportation with your own craft for a fee. They are located at the end of the Dub Denman Trail but you can continue on the Tallapoosa into Alabama where the river becomes much wider. This is private property. Fees could apply.
