

Deep Roots in Georgia's History



Hampton's historic roots extend back to the early 1820's, when the first white settlers came into the area of Bear Creek. The first mayor was Thomas Griffin Barnett in 1872; in 1873 the town of Bear

Creek was renamed Hampton after Gen. Wade Hampton.

The Monroe Railroad Company began rail service

between Forsyth and Macon in 1848. The first depot in Hampton was constructed of wood in 1867. In 1881, the current depot was completed to accommodate the growing cotton trade.



The depot was a regular stop for passenger rail service between Atlanta and Savannah by the Nancy Hanks until the train ceased operations in 1971.

The original depot was moved to Griffin, 10 miles away.

With the advent of the railroad, progress followed. Hotels and churches were built; Hampton Cotton Mills, Henderson Manufacturing Company, a foundry as well as a gristmill were all located in Hampton. At one time Hampton had 5 grocery stores, a post office, a pharmacy, and an ice plant with a daily capacity of five tons. It also had a movie theater, a furniture store, and 2 service stations, a hardware store with a funeral parlor on the second floor and a lumberyard.

Hampton continues to be a center of the manufacturing and transportation industries. It is currently home to the Atlanta Motor Speedway and the FAA's Atlanta Air Route Traffic Control Center, monitoring all in flight air

traffic in the Southeast. Southern States Manufacturing, which manufactures transformers and electrical insulators, is located on the site of the original Henderson Cotton Mills on Georgia Avenue.

Many beautiful, old homes remain in the city, as do the stately oak and magnolia trees.

Hampton's historic downtown has

undergone renovations to reflect the original hometown features of pedestrian-friendly streetscapes, landscaping,



and a variety of shops and restaurants.

The Hampton Depot Museum opened in 2010. It



houses many pictures and artifacts of life in Hampton throughout the years. Some of the oldest items include tongs from the ice plant and an oak ice box.

The Fortson Library located at 61 McDonough Street is

a new building. With ten times the original space, it is now the largest library in Henry County.
